Upon becoming king in 1509, Henry VIII immediately commissioned two warships with his own money, one of which was the *Mary Rose*. Five and a half wives later, in 1545, his heart broke as he watched her sink outside Portsmouth harbour. Dramatically raised in 1982, you can now see the *Mary Rose*, a 'must-experience British icon', and thousands of authentic, everyday Tudor objects displayed in the award-winning Mary Rose in Portsmouth.

The story of the Mary Rose in numbers

- 1510 the year the *Mary Rose* was built.
- **1545** the year in which the *Mary Rose* sank on the **19**th **July** during the 3rd French War.
- 500 men on board, only 35 survived.
- 5 **foot** 7 **inches** was the average height of a crew member.
- **1971** the year the *Mary Rose* wreck site was rediscovered and excavation of the ship began.
- **27,831** dives were logged from 1971-1982 during the excavation of the *Mary Rose*.
- **22,710** hours were spent excavating the seabed between 1971-1982.
- **437** years the *Mary Rose* spent underwater.
- **1982** the year the *Mary Rose* was raised from the seabed.
- 19,000 artefacts have been recovered from the site so far including:
 - 1,635 cannonballs
 - 257 shoes and boots (including 70 pairs)
 - 86 chests
 - 172 longbows and 2,303 complete arrows
